





RABBIT RIOT

Have lots of fun with riotous section! Dig out all of your silly programs, including "Ha, Ha, Hullahloo!" from last summer. Funny noses, gags, and all kinds of silliness is permitted and encouraged. The following are suggestions for your Riot.

SONG - "Wibbity Wabbity Woo" - a la Raffi or Cathy Fink. Use this song to get to know everyone. Rather than singing ". . . an elephant jumped on you," sing ". . . a rabbit jumped on you!"

- * STORY - APRIL RABBITS - This works especially well as a board story. Use an opaque projector to enlarge these black and white line drawings and use your imagination with the colors.


SONG - SHAKE MY SILLIES OUT - Raffi's new book of this silly song shows rabbits invading camp.

STORY - FUNNY BUNNIES - Quackenbush's colors are vibrant and translate well as a black-light flannel board story. Sound effects add another dimension.

CALL AND RESPONSE CHANT - RABBITS ON ROLLER SKATES - The repetition in this silly story makes this a good choice for a chant or rap.

- * CREATIVE DRAMATICS - "Little Rabbit Foo Foo" - Have two people be the good fairy and Little Rabbit Foo Foo while everyone else sings along with Sharon, Lois and Bram. Simple, easy to make props will bring this silly story to life!

GAME - Pin the Tail on the Bunny - Make a game board by enlarging a picture of a rabbit. Pin post-it notes with cotton balls glued to them make great tails. You don't even have to worry about pins.



RABBIT STEW

Go with "stew-pid" stories or make this a tasty treat for every bunny!

* CUT AND TELL STORY - "Carrots for Every Bunny" - Use the "carrots" you create with this cut and tell story as props for other stories. Find this and other tasty stories in MUDLUSCIOUS.

* STORY - TAWNY SCRAWNY LION - Rabbit convinces lion that fish and vegetables are much more filling than rabbit. Use paper-sculpture puppets and audience participation to tell this story.

STORY - DADDY LONG EARS - This small book shows how Daddy Long Ears became the Easter Bunny. Works well as a board story.

DRAW AND TELL STORY - "Do Tell: An Easter Surprise" - Pair this one with DADDY LONG EARS.

CRAFT - Easter egg decorations - Use either real eggs or mat board cut in ovals (available from ACCES).

STORY - MR. RABBIT AND THE LOVELY PRESENT - A rabbit puppet and some artificial fruit make this gentle story come to life.

STORY - VEGETABLE SOUP - This new book is an adaptation of the STONE SOUP theme. Use your stew pot and artificial vegetables to tell this story. As a special treat, make vegetable soup following the recipe in the book.

STORY - CARROT CAKE - Mrs. Rabbit gets the last word in this funny story. Make a carrot cake in the shape of a bunny, or serve individual rabbit cup cakes.

SONG - "Ol' John Rabbit" from MAINLY MOTHER GOOSE or "Rabbit Ain't Got No Tail" from THE FUN-TO-SING SONGBOOK.

STORY - "Rabbit and the Willow Tree" from IROQUOIS STORIES - Rabbit appears in many cultures. This Iroquois story explains why rabbit has a split upper lip, short front legs, and a short tail.

STORY - "Uwungelema" from THE FLANNEL BOARD STORYTELLING BOOK - An African story with patterns for the flannel board.



BUNNY HOP

Get ready for all kinds of action and movement with the BUNNY HOP!

- * STORY - FOOLISH RABBIT'S BIG MISTAKE - Use the book or the filmstrip (Random House) for the beautiful illustrations. Let children use instruments to simulate the running sounds of all the animals in this version of "Chicken Little."
- * STORY - "Tug-'O-War" from AFRICAN MYTHS AND LEGENDS - Try this as a creative dramatics story using bag puppets, stick puppets, OR enlarge the characters and use them like sandwich boards.

STORY - "Alligator's Sunday Suit" from BO RABBIT SMART FOR TRUE - Bo Rabbit shows Crocodile what Trouble is. This and other Bo Rabbit stories work well as told stories or as a box puppet theater.

STORY - DANCE AWAY - Rabbit's passion for dancing saves all the rabbits from the hungry fox. Try this as a told story and have all the listener's dance with Rabbit and his friends.

STORY - RUNAWAY BUNNY - Tell this traditional story with the help of stick puppets.

- * STORY - "Rabbit and Hyena Play the Senza" from THE STORY VINE - Rabbit tricks the Guinea Hens, however, hyena is not quite so smart. Use the sanza (thumb piano) to tell this story.

CRAFT Make thumb pianos with older children so they can help tell "Rabbit and Hyena . . ."

CLOTHES LINE STORY - TEN LITTLE BUNNIES - Easy rhyme with active bunnies.

DANCE - THE BUNNY HOP - Play a record of "The Bunny Hop" and let everyone join the action. All ages will enjoy this action filled finale.




PAPER RABBIT INSTRUCTIONS

1. Form 2 circles, 1 for body, 1 for head. Glue.
2. Glue head and body circles together, inserting ears between circles.
3. Glue on feet, at bottom of head circle.
4. Use paper punch to punch out dots of construction paper to make eyes (black) and nose (pink).
5. Cut small, match stick sized black paper for whiskers.
6. Glue cotton ball on for tail.

Could also use pastel colors of wallpaper for rabbit!

RABBIT & MICE FINGER PUPPET PATTERNS


MATERIALS: 1 each of 8½"X11½" grey, white, and pink felt pieces obtainable at any fabric store. Embroidery floss in matching and contrasting colors. See individual directions for colors and additional materials. Small black beads or goggly eyes for eyes. Elmer's glue and cotton balls.


GENERAL DIRECTIONS: Trace full-size patterns; fine lines indicate embroidery; X's indicate ear placement. Using patterns, cut pieces from felt in colors indicated; cut two body and ear pieces for each animal. Separate embroidery floss and work with two strands in needle.

To assemble each puppet, place the two body sections together; with matching floss and small blanket stitch, stitch body sections from bottom front edge to top of head; seam will be in center of body. Add facial details, ears, whiskers as indicated in directions. When details are completed, finish stitching body seam from head to bottom back edge, leaving bottom end open for finger. Stuff head, pushing cotton balls into place until head is approximately 1" in diameter. To secure stuffing, wrap matching floss around neck three or four times; knot tightly or take two stitches in back of neck.



RABBIT: White felt, pink felt scrap; white and pink embroidery floss; cotton balls. Cut white body and ears and pink inner ears. Construct body, following general directions; use pink floss for eyes and nose. (Black bead can substituted for nose and goggly eyes for eyes.) Glue pink inner ears to white ears, Glue on ears where indicated by X; hold in place until dry. Glue small cotton ball to lower back for tail. Draw two short lengths of white floss through nose for whiskers; place small dab of glue to anchor.

MICE: Grey felt, pink felt scrap; grey and pink embroidery floss; cotton balls. Cut grey body and ears and pink inner ears. Construct body, following general directions; use pink floss for nose or small black bead. Use small black beads or goggly eyes for eyes. Glue pink inner ears to grey ears. Glue on ears where indicated by X; hold in place until dry. Draw two short lengths of grey floss through nose for whiskers; place small dab of glue to anchor.






WAYS START WITH FOLD ON LEFT SIDE - DO NOT CUT




VIEW FOR TAILOR, OR SIMILAR


